Tell the dispatcher the type of emergency, your name and address and do not hang up until dispatchers tell you to! Have someone outside to meet emergency vehicle.




Plan Your Escape

Fire can spread rapidly through your home, leaving you as little as one or two minutes to escape safely once the alarm sounds. Take the time to draw up an escape plan with everyone in your household. Their should be two ways out of each room, including windows and doors. Also, mark the location of each smoke alarm and change your alarms batteries whenever you change your clocks. Walk through your

home and inspect all possible exits and escape routes with your family members. Know the emergency number to call and have a designated meeting place outside the home.

How Can You Prevent E-Bike Battery Fires?

An e-bike fire doesn't just happen. It's almost always caused by an off-brand battery or gross negligence in battery care. By following these five steps, you can help prevent an e-bike fire.

- 1. Never use an off-brand or after-market replacement battery or charger.
- 2. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions when charging, storing and maintaining your e-bike battery.
- 3. Store your e-bike battery in a clean, dry and temperature-controlled environment. Don't store your battery on or near water heaters or in direct sunlight.
- 4. Always contact the manufacturer directly if you're having trouble with your battery or if the battery has been damaged.
 - 5. Don't open your battery! Leave servicing e-bike batteries for the electric engineering professionals at the e-bike manufacturer.

So, are electric bikes batteries safe? The answer depends on where you purchase your e-bike from and how you take care of your battery. If you purchase a bike with a UL-compliant battery and follow simple manufacturer guidelines on the battery, owning and operating an e-bike is just as safe as other forms of transportation.

Close The Door!

A door is one of the best pieces of firefighting equipment. It can reduce fire growth and spread, limit damage to your home/building and save lives.

- Close the bedroom door when sleeping.
- Close the doors behind you when escaping a room or building that is on fire.
- Keep fire doors closed. Never wedge, disable or prop open fire doors.





In an emergency every second counts!

Make sure your fire hydrant is clear at least 3ft on each side and your house number is visible from both sides of the street!
